Cast loose from Messiah!" Heaven-throned God breaks out laughing. At first he's amused at their presumption; Then he gets good and angry. Furiously, he shuts them up: "Don't you know there's a King in Zion? A coronation banquet Is spread for him on the holy summit."

Bad guys have it in for the good guys, obsessed with doing them in. But God isn't losing any sleep; to him they're a joke with no punch line.

Jeremiah 48:25-33

"Moab's link to power is severed. Moab's arm is broken." God's Decree. The Sheer Nothingness of Moab "Turn Moab into a drunken sot, drunk on the wine of my wrath, a dung-faced drunk, filling the country with vomit - Moab a falling-down drunk, a joke in bad taste. Wasn't it you, Moab, who made crude jokes over Israel? And when they were caught in bad company, didn't you cluck and gossip and snicker? "Leave town! Leave! Look for a home in the cliffs, you who grew up in Moab. Try living like a dove who nests high in the river gorge. "We've all heard of Moab's pride, that legendary pride, The strutting, bullying, puffed-up pride, the insufferable arrogance. I know" - God's Decree - "his rooster-crowing pride, the inflated claims, the sheer nothingness of Moab. But I will weep for Moab, yes, I will mourn for the people of Moab. I will even mourn for the people of Kir-heres. I'll weep for the grapevines of Sibmah and join Jazer in her weeping -Grapevines that once reached the Dead Sea with tendrils as far as Jazer. Your summer fruit and your bursting grapes will be looted by brutal plunderers, Lush Moab stripped of song and laughter. And yes, I'll shut down the winepresses, stop all the shouts and hurrahs of harvest.

Nahum 3:5-7

"I'm your enemy, Whore Nineveh - I, God-of-the-Angel-Armies! I'll strip you of your seductive silk robes and expose you on the world stage. I'll let the nations get their fill of the ugly truth of who you really are and have been all along. I'll pelt you with dog dung and place you on a pedestal: 'Slut on Exhibit.' Everyone who sees you will gag and say, 'Nineveh's a pigsty: What on earth did we ever see in her? Who would give her a second look? Ugh!" Past the Point of No Return

Psalm 22:7-8

Everyone pokes fun at me; they make faces at me, they shake their heads: "Let's see how God handles this one; since God likes him so much, let him help him!"

Matthew 27:27-44

The soldiers assigned to the governor took Jesus into the governor's palace and got the entire brigade together for some fun. They stripped him and dressed him in a red toga. They plaited a crown from branches of a thorn bush and set it on his head. They put a stick in his right hand for a scepter. Then they knelt before him in mocking reverence: "Bravo, King of the Jews!" they said. "Bravo!" Then they spit on him and hit him on the head with the stick. When they had had their fun, they took off the toga and put his own clothes back on him. Then they proceeded out to the crucifixion. Along the way they came on a man from Cyrene named Simon and made him carry Jesus' cross. Arriving at Golgotha, the place they call "Skull Hill," they offered him a mild painkiller (a mixture of wine and myrrh), but when he tasted it he wouldn't drink it. After they had finished nailing him to the cross and were waiting for him to die, they whiled away the time by throwing dice for his clothes. Above his head they had posted the criminal charge against him: THIS IS JESUS, THE KING OF THE JEWS. Along with him, they also crucified two criminals, one to his right, the other to his left. People passing along the road jeered, shaking their heads in mock lament: "You bragged that you could tear down the Temple and then rebuild it in three days - so show us your stuff! Save yourself! If you're really God's Son, come down from that cross!" The high priests, along with the religion scholars and leaders, were right there mixing it up with the rest of them, having a great time poking fun at him: "He saved others - he can't save himself! King of Israel, is he? Then let him get down from that cross. We'll all become believers then! He was so sure of God - well, let him rescue his 'Son' now - if he wants him! He did claim to be God's Son, didn't he?" Even the two criminals crucified next to him joined in the mockery.

I Peter 2:23,24

They called him every name in the book and he said nothing back. He suffered in silence, content to let God set things right. He used his servant body to carry our sins to the Cross so we could be rid of sin, free to live the right way. His wounds became your healing.

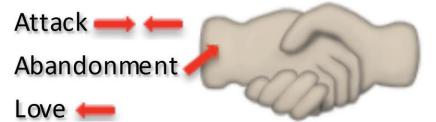

LOVE Holy Contempt – The Mockery of Evil!

Psalm 2:1-6; 37:12,13

RESPONSE TO LOVE GONE BAD: The Model of God.

- 1. MOCKER > God is a mocker. He laughs with scorn at the obstinate folly of the arrogant. He ridicules with mockery and curses.
- 2. <u>MOCK—WEAKNESS—TRUST</u> > You must learn to mock with God's perspective, boast in weakness, and taunt death and suffering with the confident laughter of trust.
- 3. STORY > God mocks a nation: once a proud nation, Moab will become an object of disgust and ridicule (Jeremiah 48:25-33). God is depicted as making Moab (a country near the Dead Sea in continual conflict with Israel) wallow in its byproduct of sin (vomit).
- **4.** HUMILIATER > God humiliates His laughter stings, His ridicule pierces, but His humiliation crushes pride (Nahum 3:5-7). Three considerations:
 - 1. <u>Humiliation</u> exposes the crime > God exposes the horror of Nineveh's sin.
 - **2.** <u>Humiliation</u> is poetic justice > God pelts her with filth (dung). Poetic vengeance matches the meter of sin with the rhythm of shame.
 - 3. <u>Humiliation</u> provokes horror > Repent or be consumed by God's burning rage.

RESPONSE TO LOVE GONE BAD: God's Mockery of God!

- 1. <u>WONDER</u> > All the contempt that should be directed against your sin, God hurled at the glorious Son. Horror opens the door to wonder—the invitation to worship.
- 2. <u>JESUS</u> > God is willing to bear the mockery and shame that moves you to the wonder that evokes worship (Psalm 22:7-8). Jesus quietly bore the contempt of His creation—He seemed to draw it forth by refusing to defend His person and prove His calling (Matthew 27:27-44; I Peter 2:23).
- **3.** <u>SURRENDER</u> > The foolishness of contempt unleashed compels you to work harder to save face, which in turns spurs further contempt. But no matter how intensely you mock, you will never get what you need, what only humble repentance can gain: GRACE. You need forgiveness and you need to offer forgiveness.

RESPONSE TO LOVE GONE BAD: Mock Like God!

- **1. HOW CAN IT BE**! How could God, the Father curse His Son? How could the perfect, beautiful, pure Son be assaulted with the vile content of your soul? How could He take your place—how could He bear you sin?
- 2. <u>MYSTERY</u> > In a mysterious instant, the Father who loved the Son from all eternity turned from Him in hatred (Galatians 3:13; I Peter 2:24)?
- 3. <u>FATHER'S RESPONSE</u> > No matter how hard your heart becomes or how far you flee, the Father's response at your return is not cold, cruel, cutting eyes, but the open arms of One who knows joy, not contempt, toward you.
