### Heroes - Be Like That - Connection!

- 1. <u>LOVE</u> > All of us need someone whose love and acceptance is a lifeline during time of stress. With it, we can endure most any trial. Without it, stress multiples and we may spiral into despair, compulsive behaviors, and burnout. All of us need someone we can count on. All of us need a Hero.
- 2. <u>Safe Space</u> > How do people feel in your presence? Providing a space for another person to open up can be the hardest, most intentional work we do in our heroic journey. Quote by Henri Nouwen.
- 3. HOW > L-O-V-E offerings:
  - 1. <u>Listening</u> > involves our eyes and hearts as much as our ears. Nonverbal signals often tell more than the words convey. Holding space and silence for another person is incredibly meaningful.
  - **Openness** > Hold back from interjecting our experience during someone's sharing of their own; others don't need you to solve their issues; come alongside the other.
  - **3.** <u>Vulnerability</u> > Many of us hold onto our failures long after God has forgiven us. We operate from a place of fear. Like Adam and Eve, we hide!
  - **4. Empathy** > Our first goal in any conversation is for the other person to feel and be understood. This can only be achieved by suspending our preoccupation with ourselves and entering into the experience of the other person. Free of self-concern equals *WITH YOU*!

## Hero: Connection – Friendship of David & Jonathan I Samuel 18-20; John 15:13,14

- 1. <u>Feeling Unloved</u> > Sooner or later we find ourselves treated as trespassers or rivals—the enemy. David did. The way David lived can be accounted for only by understanding the ways he experienced and handled criticism. What do you do when you're criticized, teased, avoided, attacked, shot at, abandoned, stoned, cursed, hunted down, snubbed, stabbed in the back, treated like a doormat, and damned with faint praise?
- 2. Opposition > Saul hated David because David was good (I Samuel 18:11). David was doing everything right when Saul tried to kill him. He had killed the Philistine giant, ending the impasse with Israel's enemy, and he had brought healing to Saul's tortured spirit, quieting the turbulence in the troubled king. He was just what the nation needed; was just what the king needed. For doing these good works he nearly got himself killed. We expect to get called on the carpet for doing wrong; we don't expect it for doing right (I Samuel 20:1). See Psalm 7.

## Hero: Connection – Friendship of David & Jonathan I Samuel 18-20; John 15:13,14

- 3. <u>Brotherhood</u> > Interwoven throughout this murderous plotting of King Saul is the extraordinary friendship between David and Jonathan, Saul's son. Together they tried to understand Saul. They both wanted the best for Saul. And yet, Jonathan helped his friend David (I Samuel 20:23).
- **4.** <u>Friendship</u> > A much underestimated aspect of spirituality. It's every bit as significant as prayer and fasting. Jonathan's friendship was essential to David's life. It's highly unlikely that David could have persisted in serving Saul without the friendship of Jonathan. Jonathan, in striking contrast to his father, discerned God in David, comprehended the danger and difficulty of his anointing, and made a covenant of friendship with him. Jonathan's friendship entered David's soul in a way that Saul's hatred never did.

### Hero: David and the Power of Connection

- 1. <u>Good Wins</u> > After Saul's sixth attempt on his life, David ran for protection to the prophet Samuel at Ramah, where Samuel presided over a school of prophets. Saul sought to kill David for the seventh time. He arrived at Ramah with murder on his mind, but he and his evil intent were no match for the power of God. He was soon completely under the influence of God's Spirit and giving witness to God's presence.
- 2. <u>Evil Loses</u> > If we are to live large and free in the context of God, we must learn what God has revealed to us. The story of David shows the massive resources of royalty are ranged against the young warrior. And what happens? After each outbreak of violence, King Saul is weaker and more distraught; after each outbreak of violence, David is stronger and still befriended. David, his election, vocation, and imagination confirmed by Jonathan's friendship, refuses the way of violence and embraces the way of love and service. Evil loses. Love wins!
