ROAD TO CHRISTMAS - Saul, David, and Jesus!

- 1. ______→ Israel's self-appointed King dies. Israel herself, being under the leadership of Saul, was left naked, shamed, mocked, and defeated—Israel was as good as dead. Saul was slain because God had rejected his kingship. Saul's disobedience, lack of leadership, fleshliness and selfishness (I Sam. 13-15) had caused God to choose another king to be head and leader over Israel, and to give her renewed strength and power (I Sam. 16:1 & 16:12-14).
- 2. A pattern of death and resurrection is set in place through Saul and David. Through Saul, a man who was fleshly, selfish, self-focused, and power-hungry, death resulted under his leadership. Through David, God has given unconditional blessing and flourishing life. God has removed one head from Israel and replaced it with another. In David, Israel finds everlasting blessing and faithfulness. In Saul, Israel dies, withers, is lifeless. In David, Israel finds life and covenant faithfulness. In David, Israel finds herself under a place of blessedness with God.
- 3. _____ → David is a type of the greater King to come, Jesus. In Jesus we find overwhelming faithfulness, acceptance, love, and blessing with God. In our strength—we are like Saul—we find only death. In our flesh, we find decay, sadness, and hopelessness. In our faith in Jesus—we are like David—we find life, resurrection, and joy.

ROAD TO CHRISTMAS – DAVID & JESUS. – I Samuel 16 – I Kings 2. Matthew 13:34-35.

- E. _____ → The David stories lead us to the redemptive story of Jesus by helping us to think narratively and seeing the earthiness of real life. The David story takes up so much space in Scripture because it helps us to learn what the world is, and what it means to be a human being. It's REAL!
- 2. _____ > David's importance isn't in his morality or his military prowess but in his experience of and witness to God. Every event in his life was a confrontation with God. David's story is about the way God shapes humanity to His glory.
- 3. _____ > The David story anticipates the Jesus story. Why? The David story is about the realness of humanity. David is earthy. He is emphatically human. David fighting, praying, loving, sinning.
- 4. _____ → The entire meaning of the incarnation of Jesus is that God enters our human condition, embraces it, comes to where we are to save us.

ROAD TO CHRISTMAS – DAVID & GOD. – II Samuel 22 & Psalm 18:1-20.

- ______ → The single most characteristic thing about David is God. He believed God, thought about God, imagined God, addressed God, prayed to God.
- 2. ______ → David's awareness of God is demonstrated in his metaphors: bedrock, castle, knight, crag, boulders, hideout. David named God in the immediacy of revelation and experience.
- 3. ______ → David prayed the metaphors, prayed the experience, prayed the revelation. Everything that happened to David through prayer became God's revelation within him.
- 4. ______ → David is a poet. He uses words to sing and to pray. He uses words to acknowledge reality, fresh and shining. He uses words to make something, not just talk about something.
- 5. ______ David gives witness to God's saving process in his life. As David lives in God, he sees how his character develops, decisions are made, habits nurtured, attention is trained, commandments are obeyed, and sins are confessed. See Psalm 18:21-25.
- 6. ______ → The David story is a Gospel Story, God doing for David what David could never do for himself. See Psalm 18:26-28.
- 7. David in action. David infused with the energy of God, doing the work of God. David does not withdraw from the human condition so that he can be alone with God. David is empowered by God to work in the world. David lived in a culture of violence and sex, war and promiscuity, but he articulated his life to the glory of God. See Psalm 18:29-46.
- 8. ______ → There wasn't much of David's life left unexplored or unattended. The largest part of life for David was God. See Psalm 18:47-51.

Bible Verses - The Message

Acts 13:21 — ²¹ But then they asked for a king, and God gave them Saul, son of Kish, out of the tribe of Benjamin. After Saul had ruled forty years.

<u>John 1:13, 14 – 13</u> These are the God-begotten, not blood-begotten, not flesh-begotten, not sex-begotten. ¹⁴ The Word became flesh and blood, and moved into the neighborhood. We saw the glory with our own eyes, the one-of-a-kind glory, like Father, like Son, Generous inside and out, true from start to finish.

I Samuel 16:1; 12-14 – ¹ God addressed Samuel: "So, how long are you going to mope over Saul? You know I've rejected him as king over Israel. Fill your flask with anointing oil and get going. I'm sending you to Jesse of Bethlehem. I've spotted the very king I want among his sons." ¹² Jesse sent for him. He was brought in, the very picture of health - bright-eyed, good-looking. God said, "Up on your feet! Anoint him! This is the one." ¹³ Samuel took his flask of oil and anointed him, with his brothers standing around watching. The Spirit of God entered David like a rush of wind, God vitally empowering him for the rest of his life. Samuel left and went home to Ramah. ¹⁴ At that very moment the Spirit of God left Saul and in its place a black mood sent by God settled on him. He was terrified.

<u>Matthew 13:34, 35 –</u> ³⁴ All Jesus did that day was tell stories - a long storytelling afternoon. ³⁵ His storytelling fulfilled the prophecy: I will open my mouth and tell stories; I will bring out into the open things hidden since the world's first day.

<u>Psalm 18 -</u> ¹ I love you, God - you make me strong. ² God is bedrock under my feet, the castle in which I live, my rescuing knight. My God the high crag where I run for dear life, hiding behind the boulders, safe in the granite hideout. 3 I sing to God, the Praise-Lofty, and find myself safe and saved. 4 The hangman's noose was tight at my throat; devil waters rushed over me. ⁵ Hell's ropes cinched me tight; death traps barred every exit. ⁶ A hostile world! I call to God, I cry to God to help me. From his palace he hears my call; my cry brings me right into his presence - a private audience! 7 Earth wobbles and lurches; huge mountains shake like leaves, Quake like aspen leaves because of his rage. 8 His nostrils flare, bellowing smoke; his mouth spits fire. Tongues of fire dart in and out; 9 he lowers the sky. He steps down; under his feet an abyss opens up. 10 He's riding a winged creature, swift on windwings. 11 Now he's wrapped himself in a trenchcoat of black-cloud darkness. 12 But his cloud-brightness bursts through, spraying hailstones and fireballs. 13 Then God thundered out of heaven; the High God gave a great shout, spraying hailstones and fireballs. 14 God shoots his arrows pandemonium! He hurls his lightnings - a rout! 15 The

secret sources of ocean are exposed, the hidden depths of earth lie uncovered The moment you roar in protest, let loose your hurricane anger. ¹⁶ But me he caught - reached all the way from sky to sea; he pulled me out ¹⁷ that enemy chaos, the void in which I was drowning. ¹⁸ They hit me when I was down, but God stuck by me. ¹⁹ He stood me up on a wide-open field; I stood there saved - surprised to be loved! ²⁰ God made my life complete when I placed all the pieces before him. When I got my act together, he gave me a fresh start. ²¹ Now I'm alert to God's ways; I don't take God for granted. ²²Every day I review the ways he works; I try not to miss a trick. ²³ I feel put back together, and I'm watching my step. ²⁴ God rewrote the text of my life when I opened the book of my heart to his eyes.²⁵ The good people taste your goodness, The whole people taste your health, ²⁶ The true people taste your truth, The bad ones can't figure you out. 27 You take the side of the down-andout, But the stuck-up you take down a peg. ²⁸ Suddenly, God, you floodlight my life; I'm blazing with glory, God's glory! 29 I smash the bands of marauders, I vault the highest fences. 30 What a God! His road stretches straight and smooth. Every God-direction is road-tested. Everyone who runs toward him Makes it. 31 Is there any god like God? Are we not at bedrock? 32 Is not this the God who armed me, then aimed me in the right direction? 33 Now I run like a deer; I'm king of the mountain. 34 He shows me how to fight; I can bend a bronze bow! 35 You protect me with salvation-armor; you hold me up with a firm hand, caress me with your gentle ways. ³⁶ You cleared the ground under me so my footing was firm. 37 When I chased my enemies I caught them; I didn't let go till they were dead men. 38 I nailed them; they were down for good; then I walked all over them. ³⁹ You armed me well for this fight, you smashed the upstarts. 40 You made my enemies turn tail, and I wiped out the haters. 41 They cried "uncle" but Uncle didn't come; They yelled for God and got no for an answer. 42 I ground them to dust; they gusted in the wind. I threw them out, like garbage in the gutter. 43 You rescued me from a squabbling people; you made me a leader of nations. People I'd never heard of served me; 44 the moment they got wind of me they listened. 45 they came on their bellies, crawling from their hideouts. 46 Live, God! Blessings from my Rock, my free and freeing God, towering! 47 This God set things right for me and shut up the people who talked back. ⁴⁸He rescued me from enemy anger, he pulled me from the grip of upstarts, He saved me from the bullies. 49 That's why I'm thanking you, God, all over the world. That's why I'm singing songs that rhyme your name. 50 God's king takes the trophy; God's chosen is beloved. I mean David and all his children - always


