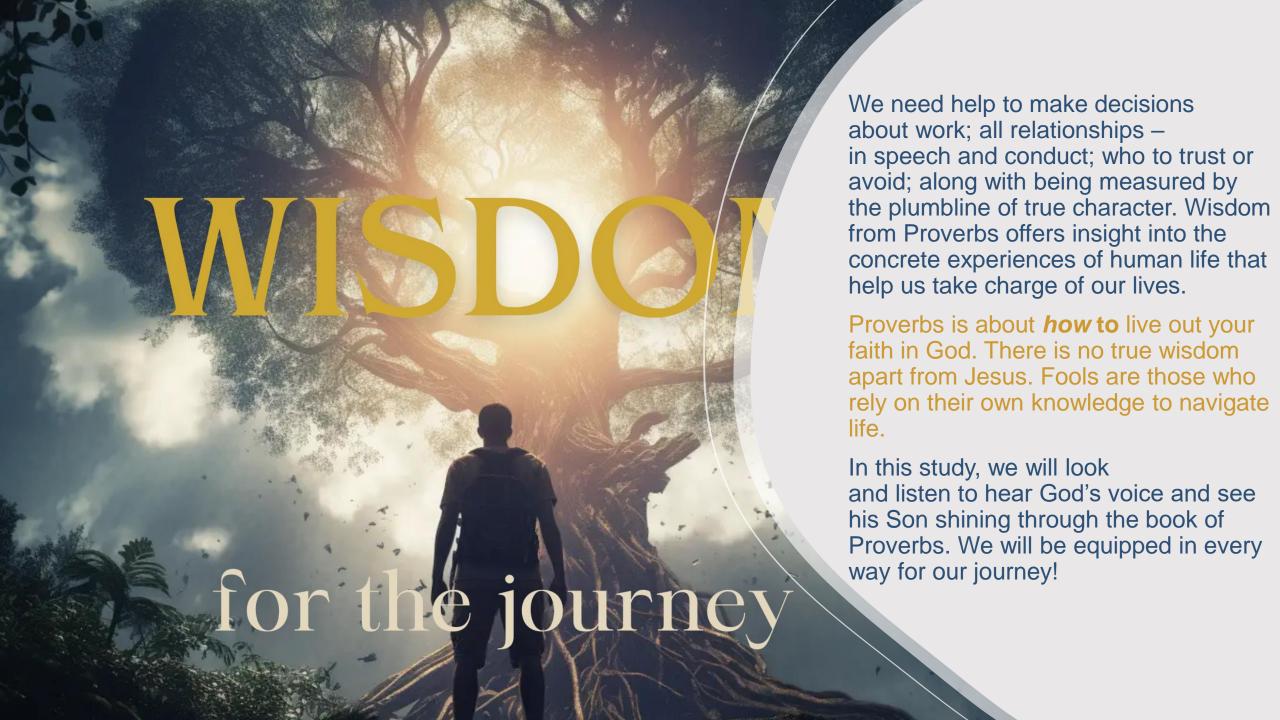


"A wise man will hear and increase in learning, and a man of understanding will acquire wise counsel." – Proverbs 1:5

MONEY & WORK





1. **WEALTH IS GOOD** - Proverbs 8:17-19, 10:22, 10:15→ Wisdom's self-control and self-knowledge, it's ability to plan and to take advice, all tend to bring about greater prosperity. The wise person does not do painful overwork but simply works hard and lets the blessing of the Lord determine how wealthy the work makes them. Wealth is a great good as long as it does not become your summum bonum—your greatest good. Half of the times the Hebrew word for wealth is used in Proverbs, we are told to prize it. Strikingly, the other half of the times the word is used, we are told not to trust it (12:27, 13:7, 19:14, 29:3, 19:4). Wealth can be BOTH – ruinous to those with abundance and ruinous to those who lack money.



2. DANGER OF EASY MONEY – Proverbs 13:11, 21:20, 11:1, 20:10, 17 → Money that comes suddenly rather than gradually can prevent character and habits necessary for life—diligence, vigilance, and skillfulness. Money has the power to corrupt your integrity. You might be a person of honesty and character, but in the presence of a lot of money, it is remarkable how many people will make compromises. Money has never had so many ways to tempt you. Don't be naïve about its power.




3. MONEY CAN MAKE YOU CRAZY – Proverbs

11:26, 20:14, 28:8, 11:4, 28:11, 30:9) If all we own belongs to God and is given to us only as stewards (I Chronicles 29:14), the is always another "bottom line" in our financial dealings: the good of others, the good of the community. Money can make you dishonest, but more often it makes you ruthless. Money has the power to make you think that ruthlessness is just normal. Wealth has the power to absorb your time, energy, and imagination so you have too little left to pay attention to more important things. Wealth blinds you to Judgment Day questions. Instead of acknowledging the enormous number of factors outside your control that brought the money to you, even with all your work, you attribute it all to your cleverness and discipline. Thus you become wise in your own eyes, the essence of foolishness (28:11). The ultimate danger of wealth is it leads us to say, "Who is the Lord?" - "Why do I need God?"



- 1. HARD WORK Proverbs. 12:24, 14:23, 16:23) → What are the factors that, in general, bring greater prosperity? The first is simple *diligence and hard work*. At one level, hard work is inspired by simple hunger, the need for the basics of physical survival (16:26). The deeper background behind work in Proverbs is the book of Genesis, where we see God with his hands in the dirt (Gen. 2:7, 15, 19).
- 2. <u>INTEGRITY IN WORK</u> Proverbs 12:11, 28:19 → The second factor that can bring prosperity is work that is not just diligent but done with integrity. Anyone who complies with ethical guidelines only out of self-interest will almost certainly fail morally. We must root out the motives of fear, pride, and self-pity that can make us dishonest.
