1.	<u>Understanding</u> - You trust people who 'get you.' They listen, empathize, and validate your perspective without quick fixes.
2.	Motive - Trust is built when the other person's heart is for you, not just for their own interests. You feel safe when someone genuinely wants your
	good.
3.	<u>Ability</u> - Good intentions aren't enough. We trust people who are competent—who have the skills, wisdom, or experience to follow through.
4.	<u>Character</u> - You trust those who do the right thing when it costs them. Integrity, humility, and consistency over time shape deep trust.
5.	<u>Track Record</u> - Trust is strengthened when someone has shown up again and again—when they've proven themselves trustworthy through real-life
	situations.

Fou	ur traits of trustworthy character:
1.	<u>Grace and Truth</u> – The ability to offer mercy while still holding to what is right.
2.	<u>Ownership</u> – The capacity to take responsibility without blaming others.
3.	Emotional Regulation – Staying grounded under pressure.
4.	Empathy – Choosing connection over control.

Track Record - The Fifth Essential of Trust.

Your track record—history of reliability—matters deeply in determining whether you are trustworthy.

- 2. ______ Trust is built on consistent, observed follow-through. A trustworthy person owns mistakes, grows through them, and builds a new pattern. Moses did just that. His life reminds us that our starting point doesn't define us. Our willingness to grow, own our flaws, and keep walking with God does.

SCRIPTURE – The Message

Exodus 3:1-12 - 1 Now Moses was tending the flock of Jethro his father-inlaw, the priest of Midian, and he led the flock to the far side of the wilderness and came to Horeb, the mountain of God.2 There the angel of the LORD appeared to him in flames of fire from within a bush. Moses saw that though the bush was on fire it did not burn up.3 So Moses thought, "I will go over and see this strange sight—why the bush does not burn up."4 When the LORD saw that he had gone over to look, God called to him from within the bush, "Moses! Moses!" And Moses said, "Here I am."5 "Do not come any closer," God said. "Take off your sandals, for the place where you are standing is holy ground." 6 Then he said, "I am the God of your father, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac and the God of Jacob." At this, Moses hid his face, because he was afraid to look at God. 7 The LORD said, "I have indeed seen the misery of my people in Egypt. I have heard them crying out because of their slave drivers, and I am concerned about their suffering. 8 So I have come down to rescue them from the hand of the Egyptians and to bring them up out of that land into a good and spacious land, a land flowing with milk and honey—the home of the Canaanites, Hittites, Amorites, Perizzites, Hivites and Jebusites. 9 And now the cry of the Israelites has reached me, and I have seen the way the Egyptians are oppressing them. 10 So now, go. I am sending you to Pharaoh to bring my people the Israelites out of Egypt."11 But Moses said to God, "Who am I that I should go to Pharaoh and bring the Israelites out of Egypt?"12 And God said, "I will be with you.

And this will be the sign to you that it is I who have sent you: When you have brought the people out of Egypt, you will worship God on this mountain."

Exodus 4:10-12 - 10 Moses said to the LORD, "Pardon your servant, Lord. I have never been eloquent, neither in the past nor since you have spoken to your servant. I am slow of speech and tongue." 11 The LORD said to him, "Who gave human beings their mouths? Who makes them deaf or mute? Who gives them sight or makes them blind? Is it not I, the LORD? 12 Now go; I will help you speak and will teach you what to say."

Exodus 33:12-17 - 12 Moses said to the LORD, "You have been telling me, 'Lead these people,' but you have not let me know whom you will send with me. You have said, 'I know you by name and you have found favor with me.'13 If you are pleased with me, teach me your ways so I may know you and continue to find favor with you. Remember that this nation is your people."14 The LORD replied, "My Presence will go with you, and I will give you rest."15 Then Moses said to him, "If your Presence does not go with us, do not send us up from here.16 How will anyone know that you are pleased with me and with your people unless you go with us? What else will distinguish me and your people from all the other people on the face of the earth?"17 And the LORD said to Moses, "I will do the very thing you have asked, because I am pleased with you and I know you by name."
